Invasive Species

Asian Giant Hornet (Vespa mandarinia)

Asian giant hornets are the largest hornet in the world and are found throughout Southeast Asia. They were first seen in 2019 in Nanaimo. Individual dead hornets have been found in the Fraser Valley region in 2020, but no nests have been found on mainland BC. Asian giant hornets typically nest underground, and pose a serious threat to the beekeeping industry. The head is bright orange with entirely black eyes. The thorax is dark, and the wings brown. The abdomen has black and orange stripes. Size varies between 2.5-5 cm. Learn more
