Despite the essential role that ecosystem services play in our lives, they're often ignored in decision-making because we don't recognize their value. This project aims to change that by measuring and valuing these services.

Bylaw Vote

Bylaws, bylaws, bylaws! We're getting close to the 70% of members that we need to be able to get our bylaws and constitution in line with requirements under the BC Societies Act.

Key changes to the updated bylaws and constitution:

- Updating language to be compliant with the new Societies Act (2016) by using the model bylaws template provided by the province of BC,
- 2. Clearly identifying the relationship of SER-WC with SER,
- Ensuring consistency with SER's bylaws and governing documents, and
- Providing specific details on the responsibilities of Chair, Vice-Chair, Secretary, Treasurer, and Directors-at-Large.



Invasive Species

Common Comfrey (Symphytum officinale)

Herbaceous perennial native to Europe with white or purple flowers that droop and hang like bluebells.. This plant is quite tall with large, pointed fuzzy oval leaves. It ranges in height from 0.6 to 1 m tall.

. Common comfrey is a known problem in the Peace River region. It is very difficult to remove due to its tendency to sprout whole plants from small root fragments.

Prevention is the best approach. If you have an infestation of comfrey in your area, repeated mowing prior to flowering can help minimize the spread of this plant. Herbicides are also an option.

A few non-invasive alternatives to plant instead of Common Comfrey include:

Anise-Scented Sage (Salvia guarantica)

Berggarten Sage (Salvia officinalis 'Berggarten')

Common Harebell (Campanula rotundifolia)

Lamb's Ear (Stachys byzantina)

Lungwort (Pulmonaria officinalis)
